EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Crime in Delaware is the official report of serious crime known to Delaware law enforcement agencies. This report provides information about 23 Violent, Serious Property, Drug/Narcotic and Other Property and Social offenses reported in Delaware's implementation of the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) operated by the State Bureau of Investigation of the Delaware State Police. Final data for the years 2011 through 2014 and preliminary data for 2015 are included in this report. Also, as appropriate, final data for the years 2004 through 2010 are included in the data charts to illustrate long term trends.

The report includes a summary of data on serious offenses, clearances, adult and juvenile arrests, and crimes against law enforcement officers at the state and county levels, followed by a detailed data section organized by state and county.

Key Findings/Trends

Overall, the occurrence of serious crime has decreased notably since 2011. The number of serious criminal offenses known to police in 2011 was 95,872 compared with 86,610 in 2014, a decrease of 9.6%. Preliminary data for 2015 suggest a similar decline of 13% from 2011.

Violent crime in the State decreased about 13% from 2011 to 2015, but preliminary data shows almost a 3% rise from 2014 to 2015 after a multiple-year decline.

The number of Homicides in 2015 (66) was the highest of the five-year report period. New Castle and Kent Counties both saw increases from 2011 totals, while Sussex was equal to 2011.

Serious Property Offenses decreased 18% between 2011 and 2015. Motor vehicle-related theft offenses and Burglary offenses decreased around 22% and 37%, respectively, while Shoplifting offenses increased by about 12%.

Drug/Narcotic Offenses increased about 17% between 2011 and 2015. There was a small decrease (4%) from 2014 to 2015 after a multiple-year increase.

Other Property and Social Offenses decreased around 18% between 2011 and 2015. There has been a steady decline in this offense category over the past five years.

Two of the most frequently reported crimes—Assault offenses and Destruction, Damage, and Vandalism of Property offenses—showed distinct downward trends from 2011 to 2015.

Preliminary data shows an increase in Assaults from 2014 to 2015.

Based on 2015 preliminary data, offenses in all crime categories were cleared by law enforcement officers at rates comparable to or better than the rates from 2011 through 2015. Overall, 54.9% of offenses in 2015 were cleared by the end of the calendar year.

Violent crime against law enforcement officers decreased by about 25% between 2011 and 2015. No officers were killed in 2015, but 18% of the 385 assault-related offenses committed against officers resulted in injuries.

INTRODUCTION

Crime in Delaware is the official report of serious crime reported to Delaware law enforcement agencies. This report covers data on serious crimes that were reported to Delaware's state, county, and local police agencies for the years 2011 through 2015.

The report is divided into the following sections:

- A summary of serious crime data at the state and county levels.
- A detailed data section with information about serious offenses, clearance rates, arrests, law enforcement agency staffing, and violent crimes committed against law enforcement officers.
- A set of tables for select serious crimes for 2014 and 2015 broken out by jurisdiction.
- A Technical Appendix with a detailed discussion of clearance rates, along with a glossary
 of crime definitions and National Criminal Information Center (NCIC) crime codes.

Crime in Delaware 2011 – 2015 continues the changes made in the recent reports to the statistical methodology and to the design of the report to make information easier to find, understand, and use. Please see Crime in Delaware 2008 – 2012 and Crime in Delaware 2009 – 2013 for detailed discussions of those changes.

Crime in Delaware provides data about the 23 Group A Offenses reported in Delaware's implementation of the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS). These offenses include Drug/Narcotic Offenses and 22 other specific crimes/crime categories listed below:

METHODOLOGY

Data Sources

Data for this report were drawn from two sources:

- The State Bureau of Identification (SBI) of the Delaware State Police, which maintains
 Delaware's implementation of the National Incident-Based Reporting System (which,
 for simplicity, is referred to as 'NIBRS' in the data section of this report), from which
 offense, clearance, arrest, and crimes against law enforcement officers statistics are
 derived. SBI is also the source of law enforcement agency staffing numbers.
- The Delaware Population Consortium, from which state and county population figures are drawn.

Preliminary Delaware NIBRS data reports for 2015 were downloaded from the Delaware Department of Technology and Information secure document library on March 24, 2016. In accordance with the statistical refinements discussed below, the final data report for 2014 was downloaded on March 29, 2016.

Preparing the Data for Inclusion in Crime in Delaware

Checking Data Quality

NIBRS data are not automatically drawn from criminal incident reports filed by participating law enforcement agencies. Because each state has its own set of criminal statutes, offense names and definitions vary from state to state. In order to allow data from states to be examined at a national level, each jurisdiction participating in NIBRS must assign each offense a common NIBRS code before entering and submitting data to the system. This extra set of steps introduces opportunities for data errors and requires a process for checking data quality.

Having crime data that is reasonably accurate and complete is essential for producing the *Crime in Delaware* report. To ensure that the data were sufficient for use in this report, validation checks were conducted to identify any issues of concern related to data completeness and accuracy. Since the State Bureau of Identification conducts extensive data quality and review control procedures (as do the Dover, New Castle County, and Wilmington Police Departments) prior to submitting NIBRS data to the FBI, it only is necessary for the Delaware Statistical Analysis Center to perform a more limited set of validation checks.

Validation checks conducted for the 2015 preliminary and 2014 final data reports indicated these data were of sufficient quality and completeness for use in the *Crime in Delaware* report.

Preparing and Transforming Data

Single year NIBRS data reports prepared by SBI are not in a production-ready/user-friendly format, nor do they contain the various statistics (differences, crime rates, percentages) that *Crime in Delaware* includes. These data reports, downloaded as text files, were imported to Microsoft Excel before undergoing a cleaning and transformation process so that the data could be collated across years and examined at the state and county levels using appropriate computations and calculations.

The Addition of a 23rd NIBRS Offense

In 2013, the FBI began the process of collecting data about human trafficking as mandated by the William Wilberforce Trafficking Victims Protection Reauthorization Act of 2008. This process resulted in two changes to the NIBRS data, effective April 19, 2013 and May 1, 2013, respectively:

- Human Trafficking is now included as the 23rd Group A Offense in the NIBRS data and is classified as a violent crime. Two specific crimes are classified under this offense type: Commercial Sex Act and Involuntary Servitude.
- As part of the Wilberforce Act, a third specific crime was also added to the Prostitution offense type: Purchasing Prostitution.

Statistical Refinements

Crime in Delaware has undergone statistical refinements from time to time for a variety of reasons, including to account for changes in the data that are available for use in the report, to reflect changes in the way crime data are reported by other entities, and as a result of periodic reflection to enhance the usefulness and value of the report.

In 2013, several statistical refinements were made for the 2008 – 2012 report (please see *Crime in Delaware 2008 – 2012* for a detailed discussion of the refinements), including:

- Standardizing the reference periods for prior year data. Delaware's NIBRS data for a given year are considered to be final for *Crime in Delaware* reporting purposes 12 to 15 months after the end of the reporting year, when the data are sufficiently stable.
- Alterations to the way change over time is examined and reported. Final data are statistically compared only with final data and preliminary data for 2015 are only compared with preliminary data from prior years. Graphs that present final data from prior years and preliminary data from 2015 are included to illustrate general trends in crime data over time.

For the 2009 – 2013 report, the time period covered by the trend graphs was expanded to include seven additional years of data. Also, a rolling average line for data prior to the current reporting year was added to most trend graphs.

No additional changes were made for the current report. However, based on steadily declining differences between preliminary and final data since the 2013 NIBRS year, the SAC may revisit its use of preliminary versus final data distinction for next year's *Crime in Delaware* report.

Notes and Important Considerations

Data in this report reflect only the serious crimes known to police (i.e., have been reported to the police or that police have observed). Some serious crime incidents are never reported or detected. Other serious crime incidents may only be reported or detected months or years after they occurred. The numbers in this report should, therefore, be considered as a floor estimate—that is, there was at least as much serious crime as noted in this report, likely more. Less serious offenses, for which NIBRS only contains arrest data, are not included in this report.

Caution should be used in drawing conclusions about changes in the occurrence of serious crime based on the data in this report. The following considerations should be kept in mind:

- NIBRS data reflect the number of offenses/charges rather than unique criminal
 incidents. A single criminal incident can result in a single charge filed by police or
 multiple charges depending on what criminal behaviors occur during the incident and
 the characteristics of the incident itself (e.g., the number of victims and alleged
 offenders).
- Be careful when comparing 2015 crime data to final crime data from prior years. For the reasons discussed earlier, 2015 crime data will not become sufficiently stable until early 2017. As a result, conclusions drawn about crime differences of 4% or less may no longer be valid once the 2015 data are final.
- Crime Rate figures (i.e., the number of crimes per 1,000 people) are best viewed in the context of other crime and population data. The Crime Rate reflects not just the change in the number of offenses known to law enforcement officers but the change in the population as well. Even if the number of offenses has not changed from one year to the next, changes in population will make it appear that crime has decreased (in the event of a population increase) or that it has increased (if the population decreases). The Crime Rate, when used by itself, can create a distorted picture of crime.
- Use caution in comparing jurisdictions, counties, and states. Differences in community socioeconomic factors, population trends, and how law enforcement agencies operate (in charging practices when an arrest is made; in interpreting crime definitions; in enforcement priorities, etc.) can vary greatly among communities, all of which create challenges in making accurate and valid comparisons. Also, participation in NIBRS is

voluntary and not all states choose to participate; even among many states that do, not all jurisdictions elect to take part. Where crime data for a state are not complete, the FBI must create estimates to account for those data gaps.

The FBI says it best in the introductory note to its *Preliminary Annual Uniform Crime Report, January-December, 2012*²:

"Individuals ... are cautioned against drawing conclusions by making direct comparisons between cities. Comparisons lead to simplistic and/or incomplete analyses that often create misleading perceptions adversely affecting communities and their residents. Valid assessments are possible only with careful study and analysis of the range of unique conditions affecting each local law enforcement jurisdiction. It is important to remember that crime is a social problem and, therefore, a concern of the entire community. The efforts of law enforcement are limited to factors within its control. The data user is, therefore, cautioned against comparing statistical data of individual agencies."

A Note About Clearances/Clearance Rates

In crime analysis, the federal definition of *clearance rate* is the percentage of offenses received that are 'solved' through an arrest or by exceptional means. An offense is 'cleared by arrest' for crime reporting purposes when at least one person is arrested, charged with the commission of the offense, and turned over to a court for prosecution.

In certain situations, an offender is known but is not or cannot be arrested and formally charged. When this happens, the offense can be cleared by *exceptional means*. Such situations include, but are not limited to, offender death or confession; an offender who cannot be extradited from another jurisdiction; refusal of a victim to cooperate in a prosecution; handling a juvenile offender through an alternative police policy.

It is important to keep in mind that the arrest or identification of one offender may clear multiple offenses. Alternatively, multiple arrests may clear only a single offense.

A more detailed explanation of clearances and clearance rates can be found in the Technical Appendix at the end of this report.

SERIOUS CRIME AT-A-GLANCE

This section of the report provides summary-level data about serious crime in Delaware and in the state's three counties for the years 2011 to 2015. Included within this section are data about the total number of serious offenses and the four major categories of crime: Violent Offenses, Serious Property Offenses, Drug Offenses, and Other Property and Social Offenses.

The specific topics addressed in this section are as follows:

- offenses received by law enforcement agencies;
- offense clearances;
- crime rates;
- differences in the number of offenses received between years;
- total arrests and arrests of adults and juveniles; and
- assaults against law enforcement officers.

All state-level summary data, organized by the topics above, are presented first. All summary data, again organized by topic, are then presented for each county. More detailed data about offenses and clearances, arrests, and assaults against law enforcement officers can be found in the '…Detailed Look at Serious Crime…' section beginning on page 30.

Note to the reader

Data for a calendar year are not considered final for the purposes of the *Crime in Delaware* report until offense counts become sufficiently stable, usually 12 - 15 months after the end of that year. Therefore, final data are provided for the 2011 - 2014 period and preliminary data for 2015.

In calculating differences between 2015 and previous years, preliminary data were used for all years (although preliminary counts for 2011 – 2014 are not provided in this report). Doing so removes the distortion inherent when computing statistical differences using preliminary and final data. Such distortion can make such differences appear larger or smaller than they actually are. Final data are used for comparisons between the years 2011 through 2014. However, graphic figures that plot final and preliminary counts are included as appropriate to illustrate trends in the data. Visual portrayals of this type of data are useful and are much less susceptible to distortion than statistical differences.

As noted earlier in this report, please use caution when comparing Delaware's data to national data or those for other states. Crime data, particularly crime rates, are best understood in the context of other data.

Delaware Serious Crime at-a-Glance, 2011 – 2015




Figure 2: Final Differences in Serious Criminal Offenses, by State and County, 2011 and 2014

Overall, there were about 13,000 fewer reported serious Group A offenses in 2015 compared to 2011, a decline of about 13% (see Table 1 and Figure 1). Three of the four crime categories were notably lower compared to 2011, with the greatest declines for Serious Property Offenses (around 18%) and Other Property and Social Offenses (around 18%). Drug/Narcotic Offenses were up about 17% since 2011, but the 2014 to 2015 period saw the first decrease since 2012. Long term trends in offenses since 2004 are also presented in Figure 1. Final differences between 2011 and 2014 for Delaware and its three counties are presented in Figure 2.

Serious Property Offenses was the most frequently reported category of crime in 2015 (32.3%), followed by Other Property and Social Offenses (28.2%), Violent Offenses (25.4%), and Drug/Narcotic Offenses (14%). These proportions are similar to those from 2011, except for Drug Offenses, which represented a larger proportion of offenses in 2015.




Figure 3: Most Common Serious Crimes in Delaware, 2004 – 2015

The most frequently reported offenses were Larceny; Assault; Destruction, Damage, and Vandalism of Property; Drug/Narcotic; Fraud; and Burglary. Assault and Destruction/ Damage/Vandalism showed distinct downward trends from 2010 to 2014 but preliminary data for Assault in 2015 show an increase from 2014 to 2015 (see Figure 3). Preliminary data for Larceny in 2015 shows a stronger downward trend than in previous years. Preliminary data for Drug/Narcotics offenses in 2015 shows a decrease after a strong upward trend the previous 2 years, and Fraud offenses look to be on a slow rise over the past few years. Burglary offenses have been decreasing noticeably the past 3 years after a long, steady rise. Figure 3 shows long term trends since 2004.





Figure 4: All Delaware Offenses, Clearances, and Arrests, 2004 – 2015

Based on 2015 preliminary data, offenses in all crime categories were cleared at rates comparable to the rates from 2011 through 2014 (see Table 1 and Figure 4). Offenses in the Drug/Narcotic and Violent offense categories continue to be cleared at high rates (94.8% and 75.5%, respectively). Overall, more than half of the offenses committed in 2015 were cleared by the end of the calendar year. Trends since 2004 can be seen in Figure 4.

The number of arrests was lower from 2011 to 2015 for all categories except Drug Offenses which saw nearly a 14% increase. Violent Offense arrests were down around 14% and Other Property and Serious Property Offenses were down 11% and 5%.

Preliminary 2015 data indicate that there were fewer violent offenses against law enforcement officers compared to the previous four years (see Table 3). No officers were killed in the line of duty in 2015 and there were 385 violent offenses against officers, a decrease of about 25% compared to 2011. Nearly all violent offenses against law enforcement officers were cleared by the end of the calendar year. Figure 5 illustrates the long term trends in assaults against Delaware law enforcement officers.



Figure 1: Serious Crime in Delaware by Category, 2004 – 2015





Figure 6: Serious Crime in New Castle County by Category, 2004 – 2015

Overall, there were about 8,400 fewer reported serious Group A offenses in the county in 2015 compared to 2011, a decline of about 15% (see Table 4 and Figure 6). Three of the four crime categories were notably lower compared to 2011, with the greatest declines for Other Property & Social Offenses (about 19%) and Serious Property Offenses (about 17%). Drug Offenses increased around 3% since 2011. Long term trends in offenses since 2004 are also presented in Figure 6.

Serious Property Offenses was the most frequently reported category of crime in the county in 2015 (34.1%), followed by Other Property and Social Offenses (28.4%), Violent Offenses (25.5%), and Drug/Narcotic Offenses (11.9%). The proportion of Drug-related offenses is similar to 2011 while the share of offenses attributed to Other Property & Social decreased about 2%.

The most frequently reported offenses in the county were Larceny; Assault; Destruction, Damage, and Vandalism of Property; Drug/Narcotic; Fraud; and Burglary. Assault and Destruction/Damage/Vandalism offenses showed distinct downward trends from 2008 to 2014, although preliminary data show an increase in Assault from 2014 to 2015 (see Figure 7). Larceny and Burglary have shown a more gradual decrease since 2012. Figure 7 also portrays the long term trends in these offenses since 2004.




Figure 8: All New Castle County Offenses, Clearances, and Arrests, 2004 – 2015

Based on 2015 preliminary data, offenses in all crime categories were cleared at rates comparable to the rates from 2011 through 2014 (see Table 4 and Figure 8). Offenses in the Drug/Narcotic and Violent offense categories continue to be cleared at high rates (93.9% and 67.4%, respectively). Overall, 48.4% of all offenses committed in 2015 were cleared by the end of the calendar year. Trends since 2004 can be seen in Figure 8.

Total arrests in the county were almost 5% lower compared to 2011 (see Table 5 and Figure 8). Juvenile arrests showed a distinct downward trend across almost all crime categories during this period (a 15.6% decrease overall). The number of adult arrests decreased about 3%, with the patterns of change for the four crime categories matching those seen for all arrests. Trends in arrests since 2004 can also be seen in Figure 8.

Preliminary 2015 data indicate that there were more violent offenses against law enforcement officers in the county compared to the 2014, but less than the three other years (see Table 6). No officers were killed in the line of duty in 2015 and there were 221 violent offenses against officers, a decrease of about 17% compared to 2011. Nearly all violent offenses against law enforcement officers in the county were cleared by the end of the calendar year. Long term trends in assaults against law enforcement officers in the county can be found in Figure 5 (presented in the Delaware Serious Crime At-a-Glance section located earlier in this report).

Kent County Serious Crime At-a-Glance, 2011 – 2015





Figure 9: Serious Crime in Kent County by Category, 2004 – 2015

Overall, there were 2,220 fewer reported serious Group A offenses in Kent County in 2015 compared to 2011, a decline of about 11% (see Table 7 and Figure 9). Three of the four crime categories—Other Property and Social Offenses, Serious Property Offenses, and Violent Offenses—were notably lower compared to 2011, with declines of around 18%, 16%, and 12%, respectively. The number of Drug/Narcotic Offenses increased markedly, around 26% since 2011. Long term trends in offenses since 2004 are also presented in Figure 9.

Serious Property Offenses was the most frequently reported category of crime in Kent County in 2015 (30.9%), followed by Other Property and Social Offenses (26.7%), Violent Offenses, (26.4%), and Drug/Narcotic Offenses (15.9%). These proportions are similar to those from 2011, except for Drug Offenses, which represented a larger proportion of offenses in 2014 (4.8 percentage points higher).

The most frequently reported offenses in the county were Larceny; Assault; Drug/Narcotic; Destruction, Damage, and Vandalism of Property; Fraud; and Burglary. Destruction/Damage/Vandalism offenses showed a distinct downward trend from 2011 to 2014 but were flat compared with 2014 (see Figure 10). Drug/Narcotic Offenses were up notably since 2011 (26.4%) while the remaining most common offenses showed more mixed patterns since 2011. Figure 10 also portrays the long term trends in these offenses since 2004.




Figure 11: All Kent County Offenses, Clearances, and Arrests, 2004 – 2015

Based on 2015 preliminary data, offenses in all crime categories were cleared at rates comparable to or better than the rates from 2011 through 2014 (see Table 7 and Figure 11). Offenses in the Drug and Violent offense categories continue to be cleared at high rates (94.6% and 85.9%, respectively). Overall, more than 60% of all offenses committed in 2015 had been cleared by the end of the calendar year. Trends since 2004 can be seen in Figure 11.

The total number of arrests in the county increased by about 8% from 2011 through 2015 (see Table 8 and Figure 11). Arrests for Violent, Serious Property and Other Property & Social Offenses declined from 2011 to 2015, while Drug Offenses arrests increased. Juvenile arrests from 2011 to 2015 showed a marked downward trend during this period (27% overall). Total adult arrests decreased about 5% overall, but a significant increase in drug arrests offset a decrease in the other 3 categories. Trends in arrests since 2004 can also be seen in Figure 11.

Preliminary 2015 data indicate that there were fewer violent offenses against law enforcement officers in the county compared to the four prior years (see Table 9). No officers were killed in the line of duty in 2015 and there were 71 violent offenses against officers, a decrease of almost 50% compared to 2011. All violent offenses against law enforcement officers in Kent County were cleared by the end of the calendar year. Long term trends in assaults against law enforcement officers in the county can be found in Figure 5 (presented in the Delaware Serious Crime At-a-Glance section located earlier in this report).

Sussex County Serious Crime At-a-Glance, 2011 – 2015





Figure 12: Serious Crime in Sussex County by Category, 2003 – 2014

Overall, there were about 2400 fewer reported serious Group A offenses in Sussex County in 2015 compared to 2011, a decrease of about 10% (see Table 10 and Figure 12). Three of the four crime categories—Violent Offenses, Serious Property Offenses, and Other Property and Social Offenses—decreased compared to 2011 (about 10%, 23%, and 14%, respectively). The number of Drug/Narcotic Offenses, however, increased around 40%. Long term trends in offenses since 2004 are also presented in Figure 12.

Serious Property Offense was the most frequently reported category of crime in the county in 2015 (29.5%), followed by Other Property and Social Offenses (29.1%), Violent Offenses, (24.2%), and Drug/Narcotic Offenses (17.1%). Drug offenses accounted for about 6% more of the total offenses, while the share for Serious Property offenses decreased about 5%.

The most frequently reported offenses in the county were Assault; Larceny; Drug/Narcotic; Destruction, Damage, and Vandalism of Property; Fraud and Burglary. Destruction/Damage/Vandalism showed a distinct downward trend from 2011 to 2015 (see Figure 13). Drug/Narcotic offenses showed a distinct upward trend during this period. Fraud generally trended upward, while Assault, Larceny and Burglary offenses showed a mixed trend. Figure 13 also portrays the long term trends in these offenses since 2004.




Figure 14: All Sussex County Offenses, Clearances, and Arrests, 2004 – 2015

Based on 2015 preliminary data, offenses in all crime categories were cleared at rates comparable to or better than the rates from 2011 through 2014 (see Table 10 and Figure 14). Drug and Violent Offenses continue to be cleared at high rates (96.2% and 85.2%, respectively). Overall, 62% of all offenses committed in 2015 had been cleared by the end of the calendar year. This is an 8% increase from 2011, mainly due to increased Other Property/Social Offense clearances. Trends since 2004 can be seen in Figure 14.

The number of all arrests decreased around 3% from 2011 through 2015. Except for Drug Offenses, which increased 45%, arrests in each offense category trended downward. Juvenile arrests showed a 29% decrease overall. Adult arrests are almost equal to 2011. Adult arrests for Drug Offenses were up over 50% since 2011, but were offset by decreases in the others. Trends in arrests since 2004 can also be seen in Figure 14.

Preliminary 2015 data indicate that violent offenses against law enforcement officers in the county were lower than 2011, but comparable to recent years (see Table 12). No officers were killed in the line of duty in 2015 and there were 93 violent offenses against officers, down 16% compared to 2011. The vast majority of violent offenses against law enforcement officers were cleared by the end of the calendar year. Long term trends in assaults against law enforcement officers in the county can be found in Figure 5 (presented in the Delaware Serious Crime At-a-Glance section located earlier in this report).

A DETAILED LOOK AT SERIOUS CRIME IN DELAWARE

The following sections provide more detailed information about serious crime in Delaware. Each section has a single topic focus: one of the four crime categories and violent crimes against law enforcement officers. Within each crime category section, statewide data on offenses, clearances, and arrests are presented first, followed by the same data for each county. The section on crimes against law enforcement officers presents the state and county data relevant to this topic.

Notes to the Reader

Data for a calendar year are not considered final for the purposes of the *Crime in Delaware* report until offense counts become sufficiently stable, usually 12 - 15 months after the end of that year. Therefore, final data are provided for the 2011 - 2014 period and preliminary data for 2015.

In comparing 2015 with previous years, preliminary data were used for all years (although preliminary counts for 2011 – 2014 are not provided in this report). Doing so removes the distortion inherent when comparing preliminary and final data. Such distortion can make differences appear larger or smaller than they actually are. Final data are used for comparisons for 2011 – 2014. Graphic figures that incorporate final and preliminary data are included as appropriate to illustrate trends in the data.

As noted earlier in this report, please use caution when comparing Delaware's data to national data or those for other states. Crime data, particularly crime rates, are best understood in the context of other data.

Some important considerations to keep in mind:

- In drawing conclusions about changes between 2015 preliminary data and the final data from prior years, be aware that some crimes (e.g., Fraud, Forgery/Counterfeiting, Arson, Homicide) are more prone to delayed reporting to law enforcement agencies or the filing of charges than other crimes.
- When examining the percentage change in offense data, please use caution in drawing conclusions about those figures without also referring to the offense numbers. Some crimes are reported at such low frequencies (e.g., Homicide, Arson, Extortion, Wire Fraud, Gambling) that the increase or decrease of even one to three cases can translate to a large percentage change that, while seemingly impressive, may not be very meaningful in actuality.

Delaware Violent Offenses and Clearances

Overall, Violent Offenses were about 13% lower in 2015 when compared with 2011. The two most commonly occurring crimes in this category of offenses—Assault and Robbery— experienced declines of around 13% and 20%, respectively. Of special note:

- Preliminary 2015 data indicate the number of Murder and Non-Negligent Manslaughter offenses (66) was at the highest mark in the five-year period.
- Robbery with a Firearm offenses decreased about 5% since 2011 (but saw a 12% increase from 2014), while Assault with a Firearm offenses increased about 25% (with almost a 10% increase from 2014).

Most Kidnapping, Assault, and Forcible Sex offenses had been cleared by the end of 2015. Less than 40% of Robbery and more than 50% of Homicide offenses were cleared during that period. Violent Offenses in 2015 were cleared at rates comparable to or better than those for the previous four years. Homicides are cleared at a lower rate due to the time involved to investigate, but clearances for 2015 homicides were the highest since 2011.




Figure 15: Delaware Violent Offenses, Clearances, and Arrests, 2004 – 2015

Tables 13 – 19 and Figure 15 provide detailed information about Statewide Violent Offenses, clearances, and juvenile and adult arrests. Long term trends since 2004 are also presented in Figure 15.

Homicides in Delaware: A Look at NIBRS Data and Beyond

The 66 total individual homicides reported in 2015 was the highest reported by Delaware since 1970. The previous highs were 58 in 2012 and 2008 and 56 in 1974. Figure xx shows Delaware homicides since 1970 (and includes the state's population growth for context).

While the number of 2015 homicides is a concern, homicide, as serious and tragic as this crime is for victims, families, and the community, should not be seen as an effective indicator of the extent of violent crime in Delaware. Instead, homicides need to be considered as a specific subset of violent crime, and in light of the appropriate and fuller contexts in which they occur.

This special section of the Crime in Delaware report is focused in exploring homicides more in depth. Included in this analysis are Delaware NIBRS data; more in-depth data the Delaware Statistical Analysis Center maintains on homicide incidents; and information from the Center's database on criminal shooting incidents.




Figure H1: Homicides and Delaware Population Growth, 1970-2015

Homicide Incidents versus Homicide Offenses: The NIBRS data system counts homicide offenses (i.e., individuals killed) as opposed to the number of incidents in which at least one homicide offense was committed. To eliminate duplicate counts of suspects, victim-offender relationships, circumstances surrounding homicides, etc. and better analyze homicide data, the

Center has tracked unique homicide incidents since 2006. These data (see Figure xx) reflect the same general pattern noted in the NIBRS for this period, but are somewhat lower.




Figure H2: Homicide Incidents, 2006-2015

Delaware Homicide Victim and Offender Demographics: Based on Delaware's NIBRS data, the state's homicide victims from 2011 through 2015 have been predominantly males 18 to 50 years old (see Table 20). Most victims were identified as Black or African American and less than 10% Hispanic/Latino. Nearly all known alleged offenders have been male and predominantly aged 18 to 34. Around three-fourths of known offenders during that period have been Black or African American.

2014 population estimates by the U.S. Census Bureau indicate that Delaware was 48.4% male and at least 22.2% Black or African American. Based on the population data, males and Blacks/African Americans are substantially over-represented among both homicide victims and suspects.

Insights about Delaware Homicide Incidents

The following are some select insights about homicides in Delaware based on the data sources mentioned earlier.

Homicides are a low base-rate crime; that is, they occur infrequently. In 2015, Homicides represented just 0.08% of all NIBRS Group A offenses and 0.24% of Group A offenses that occurred in Wilmington. They also reflected 0.32% of Violent Offenses statewide and 0.69% in Wilmington. In 2015, homicides ranked 15th among the 23 NIBRS Offenses in terms of frequency of occurrence statewide, and 15th in Wilmington as well.

Most homicides are committed with a firearm. Examination of the Delaware SAC's homicide incident data indicates this percentage has generally ranged from 70-80% statewide and 80-95% in Wilmington (see Figure xx). 2015 saw a high for the statewide percentage, with a notable increase in firearm use in homicides in the rest of the state.




Figure H3: Delaware Homicide Incidents Involving Firearms, 2006-2015

There are no consistent year-to-year seasonal or monthly patterns in homicide occurrence. Examination of the SAC's homicide incident data reveals almost no discernible patterns by season or month across years. The lone exception is for March, which has averaged 2.4 homicide incidents compared to 4.1-4.7 for the other eleven months. The absence of patterns is likely the result of two factors: the relative infrequency of incidents and the circumstances in which they occur (explored below).

Circumstances Surrounding Homicides. The Center's data on the circumstances surrounding homicides as a whole is quite limited. However, as stated above, a high proportion of homicide incidents are committed with a firearm. Homicides committed in this fashion are somewhat unique, given that: they do not require close contact with a victim; the injury potential of discharged rounds is substantial, but quite variable in terms of injuries created; and the relative ease by which a significant number of rounds can be fired.

Since shooting homicides are more closely tied to the path a bullet takes upon striking a victim, rather than the intent of the person who fired the weapon, the SAC's research on criminal shootings since 2011 provide the Center's best data relevant to the question of the circumstances surrounding homicides.

Shootings are generally not random acts. Of 389 total shooting incidents in 2013 and 2014, 180 records had enough information to discern a motive or circumstances surrounding the shooting. Close to two-thirds involved an altercation, argument, dispute, or retaliation. Robbery appeared to be a motive in almost 25% of incidents. Drug-related activity was associated with more than one-quarter of the incidents. In 10% of incidents a bystander or unintended target was struck. Intimate partner violence was factor in almost 3% of incidents

Most shooting incidents involve victims and suspects who know each other in some way. Based on 140 incidents from 2013 and 2014 where a victim-offender relationship could be determined, about 40% occurred among friends, family, acquaintances, or neighbors, with more than a third known to each other in some other way (e.g., by sight and nickname, but outside of any relationship).

<u>Criminal history appears to be a risk factor not just for committing a shooting, but also for being a victim of one</u>. Based on an examination of Delaware criminal histories for more than 900 victims and just over 500 identified suspects from incidents that occurred between 2011 and

2014, more than 95% of suspects and 90% of victims have a criminal history. Of those with a Delaware criminal history, more than 75% of each group had at least one felony arrest. More than 75% of each group had their first arrest as a juvenile (about half of suspects and just over a third of victims were younger than 14).

While criminal history is clearly associated with involvement in a shooting, there are likely several ways this history increases risk, including current involvement in criminal behavior, having personal or family relationships with those involved in criminal activity, and/or living and working in areas where there are higher levels of violent crime.

It is important to note that the above insights should not be generalized to homicides committed through other means. Cursory examination of non-firearm homicides suggests, for example, a higher proportion of incidents involving intimate partner violence than has been

New Castle County Violent Offenses and Clearances

Overall, Violent Offenses in the county were about 14% lower in 2015 when compared with 2011. The two most commonly occurring crimes in this category of offenses—Assault and Robbery—experienced declines of around 15% each. Assault offenses did increase by about 3% between 2014 and 2015, however. Of special note:

- Preliminary 2015 data indicate the number of Murder and Non-Negligent Manslaughter offenses (45) was higher than 2011 and is the second highest total in the 5 year period.
- Assault with a Firearm offenses appear to be notably up compared to 2011 (48%), while Robbery with a Firearm offenses were about 2% higher. Both crimes experienced increases compared to 2014—about 16% for both.

Most Kidnapping and Assault offenses and more than half of Forcible Sex Offenses had been cleared by the end of 2015. More than one third of Robbery and just over 40% of Homicide offenses were cleared during that period. Violent Offenses in 2015 were cleared at rates comparable to or better than those for the previous four years. Homicides clearances, although typically lower than other offenses, were better than the previous two years.




Figure 16: New Castle County Violent Offenses, Clearances, and Arrests, 2004 – 2015

Tables 21 – 27 and Figure 16 provide detailed information about New Castle County Violent Offenses, clearances, and juvenile and adult arrests. Long term trends since 2004 are also presented in Figure 16.

Kent County Violent Offenses and Clearances

Overall, Violent Offenses in the county were about 12% lower in 2015 when compared with 2011. Two of the three most common crimes, Assault and Robbery, both saw decreases from 2011, 11% and 31% respectively. Preliminary data seems to show Assault having a 6% increase from 2014 to 2015. Overall, Forcible Sex Offenses have decreased 4% from 2011, but Rape by Force has decreased almost 32% over the same period. Of special note:

- Preliminary 2015 data indicate the number of Murder/Non-Negligent Manslaughter offenses(15) almost doubled from 2011 totals (87.5%) and increased 150% from 2014.
- Robbery with a Firearm offenses decreased around 32% compared to 2011 with a 9% increase from 2014. Assault with a Firearm offenses have stayed relatively flat since 2011 except for a temporary low in 2014.

Most Violent Offenses had been cleared by the end of 2015. Most categories of Violent Offenses in 2015 were cleared at rates comparable to or better than those for the previous four years.

Tables 28–34 and Fig. 17 provide detailed information about Kent County Violent Offenses, clearances, juvenile and adult arrests. Long term trends since 2004 are also presented in Figure 17.



Sussex County Violent Offenses and Clearances

Overall, Violent Offenses in the county were about 10% lower in 2015 compared with 2011. The patterns of differences for the three most commonly occurring crimes in this category of offenses—Assault, Robbery, and Forcible Sex Offenses—varied. The number of Assaults declined 9% compared to 2011, with Robbery declining around 37% during this period. Forcible Sex Offenses decreased 17% in 2015 after a steady increase over the previous four years. Of special note:

- Preliminary 2015 data indicate the number of Murder and Non-Negligent Manslaughter offenses (four) was a 50% decrease from 2014's five year high (eight) and even with 2011 totals.
- Robbery with a Firearm offenses appear to be down about 18% compared to 2011.
- Assault with a Firearm offenses in 2015 were down 40% from a five year high in 2014 and are about 20% lower compared to 2011.

Most offenses had been cleared by the end of 2015. All categories of Violent Offenses committed in 2015 were cleared at rates comparable to or better than those for the previous four years.




Figure 18: Sussex County Violent Offenses, Clearances, and Arrests, 2004 – 2015

Tables 35 – 41 and Figure 18 provide detailed information about Sussex County Violent Offenses, clearances, and juvenile and adult arrests. Long term trends since 2004 are also presented in Figure 18.

Delaware Serious Property Offenses and Clearances

Overall, Serious Property Offenses were about 18% lower in 2015 when compared with 2011. The three most commonly occurring crimes in this category of offenses—Larceny, Burglary, and Motor Vehicle Theft—all decreased compared to 2011 but to varying extents. Burglary and Motor Vehicle Theft offenses experienced decreases of around 37% and 24%, respectively, compared with 2011, while the number of Larceny offenses was about 11% lower.

Of special note:

- While the number of Larceny offenses exhibited a small decrease:
 - o Shoplifting offenses increased about 11% compared to 2011.
 - o Theft of Motor Vehicle Parts/Accessories declined by around 48%.
 - Theft From a Building offenses decreased 12%

For almost all Serious Property Offense crimes, less than one-third of offenses had been cleared by the end of 2015. However, offenses for all crimes in this category were cleared at rates comparable to or better than those for the previous four years.




Figure 19: Delaware Serious Property Offenses, Clearances, and Arrests, 2004 – 2015

Tables 42 – 48 and Figure 19 provide detailed information about Statewide Serious Property Offenses, clearances, and juvenile and adult arrests. Long term trends since 2004 are also presented in Figure 19.

New Castle County Serious Property Offenses and Clearances

Overall, Serious Property Offenses in the county were about 17% lower in 2015 when compared with 2011. The three most commonly occurring crimes in this category of offenses—Larceny, Burglary, and Motor Vehicle Theft—all decreased but to varying extents. The number of Burglary and Motor Vehicle Theft offenses decreased about 40% and 25% compared to 2011, with Larceny offenses decreasing around 9%. Of special note:

- Larceny-Shoplifting offenses increased by about 26% compared to 2011.
- Theft of Motor Vehicle Parts/Accessories declined by more than 50%.

For almost all Serious Property Offense crimes, less than 30% of offenses had been cleared by the end of 2015. However, offenses for all crimes within this category were cleared at rates comparable to or better than those for the previous four years.




Figure 20: New Castle County Serious Property Offenses, Clearances, and Arrests, 2004 – 2015

Tables 49 – 55 and Figure 20 provide detailed information about New Castle County Serious Property Offenses, clearances, and juvenile and adult arrests. Long term trends since 2004 are also presented in Figure 20.

Kent County Serious Property Offenses and Clearances

Overall, Serious Property Offenses in the county were about 16% lower in 2015 when compared with 2011. The patterns of differences for the three most commonly occurring crimes in this category of offenses—Larceny, Burglary, and Motor Vehicle Theft—varied but all decreased. The number of Larceny offenses decreased around 7% from 2011 to 2015. Burglary and Motor Vehicle Theft offenses decreased 29% and 28%, respectively, compared to 2011.

Of special note:

- Theft From Motor Vehicle offenses has increased 13% over that period, with a 30% increase from 2014. Shoplifting experienced about a 14% decrease from 2014.
- Theft of Motor Vehicle Parts/Accessories declined by about 46%.

For almost all Serious Property Offense crimes, just under 40% of offenses had been cleared by the end of 2015. Most offenses within this category were cleared at rates comparable to or better than those for the previous four years. Burglary saw a 4% increase in its clearance rate.




Figure 21: Kent County Serious Property Offenses, Clearances, and Arrests, 2004 – 2015

Sussex County Serious Property Offenses and Clearances

Overall, Serious Property Offenses in the county were about 23% lower in 2015 when compared with 2011. The three most commonly occurring crimes in this category of offenses—Larceny, Burglary, and Motor Vehicle Theft—all exhibited decreases, but to varying extents. Burglary and Motor Vehicle Theft offenses decreased 32% and 21%, respectively, from 2011 to 2015. The number of Larceny offenses decreased about 18% compared to 2011. Of special note:

- Larceny-Shoplifting and Theft From a Building offenses both decreased by about 8% and 5%, respectively, compared to 2011. This is after five year highs in 2014.
- Theft of Motor Vehicle Parts/Accessories declined by 39% during this same period, and Theft from Motor Vehicle decreased about 24%.

For most Serious Property Offense crimes, less than 40% of offenses had been cleared by the end of 2015. However, offenses for almost all crimes in this category were cleared at rates comparable to or better than those for the previous four years.




Figure 22: Sussex County Serious Property Offenses, Clearances, and Arrests, 2004 – 2015

Tables 63 – 69 and Figure 22 provide detailed information about Sussex County Serious Property Offenses, clearances, and juvenile and adult arrests. Long term trends since 2004 are also presented in Figure 22.

Figure 23: Delaware Drug/Narcotic Offenses, Clearances, and Arrests, 2004 – 2015



Figure 24: New Castle County Drug/Narcotic Offenses, Clearances, and Arrests, 2004 – 2015



Figure 25: Kent County Drug/Narcotic Offenses, Clearances, and Arrests, 2004 – 2015



Figure 26: Sussex County Drug/Narcotic Offenses, Clearances, and Arrests, 2004 – 2015



Delaware Other Property and Social Offenses and Clearances

Overall, Other Property and Social Offenses were around 18% lower in 2015 when compared with 2011. The patterns of differences for the three most commonly occurring crimes in this category of offenses—Property Destruction/Damage/Vandalism, Fraud, and Weapon Law Violations—varied somewhat. The number of Fraud offenses was about 7% higher compared to 2011. Property Destruction/Damage/Vandalism Offenses decreased substantially since 2011 ,about 32%, while Weapon Law Violations were about 4% lower. Prostitution increased about 148% from 2011 to 2015 and Stolen Property increased 75% over the same period.

Overall, just over 40% of all Other Property and Social Offenses had been cleared by the end of 2015. Most crimes within this category of offenses were cleared at rates well above 50%. However, the crime with the lowest clearance rate—Property Destruction/Damage/Vandalism—accounted for 51% of the offenses in this category, suppressing the overall clearance rate. Almost all crimes within this category of offenses were cleared at rates comparable to or better than those for the previous four years.




Figure 27: Delaware Other Property and Social Offenses, Clearances, and Arrests, 2004 – 2015

Tables 90 – 98 and Figure 27 provide detailed information about Statewide Other Property and Social Offenses, clearances, and juvenile and adult arrests. Long term trends since 2004 are also presented in Figure 27.

New Castle County Other Property and Social Offenses and Clearances

Overall, Other Property and Social Offenses in the county were around 19% lower in 2015 compared to 2011. The patterns of differences for the three most commonly occurring crimes in this category—Property Destruction/Damage/Vandalism, Fraud, and Weapon Law Violations—varied somewhat. Vandalism was down about 33%, Fraud was up 10% and Weapons Violations were relatively flat compared to 2011.

Some other categories of note:

- Prostitution increased almost 72% from 2014, and around 325% since 2011
- Counterfeiting/Forgery has decreased about 44% since 2011

Overall, a little more than 35% of all Other Property and Social Offenses had been cleared by the end of 2015. Most crimes within this category of offenses were cleared at rates well above 50%. However, the crime with the lowest clearance rate - Property Destruction/Damage/Vandalism – accounts for 54% of the offenses in this category, suppressing the overall clearance rate. All crimes in this category of offenses were cleared at rates comparable to or better than those for the previous four years.

Figure 28: NCC Other Property and Social Offenses, Clearances, and Arrests, 2004 – 2015



Kent County Other Property and Social Offenses and Clearances

Overall, Other Property and Social Offenses in the county were around 19% lower in 2015 when compared with 2011. The three most commonly occurring crimes in this category—Property Destruction/Damage/Vandalism, Fraud, and Weapon Law Violations—were all down since 2011. Property Destruction/Damage/Vandalism offenses and Weapon Law Violations decreased substantially, 28% and 14% respectively. The number of Fraud offenses was 7% lower compared to 2011. Weapons Law Violations were down 14% compared to 2011, but shows a 16% increase since 2014. Counterfeiting saw a 34% in from 2014 to 2015 after a steady decline since 2011.

Overall, just over half of all Other Property and Social Offenses had been cleared by the end of 2015. Most crimes within this category of offenses were cleared at rates well above 50%. However, the crime with the lowest clearance rate, Property Destruction/Damage/Vandalism, accounts for 48% of the offenses in this category, suppressing the overall clearance rate. Almost all crimes in this category of offenses were cleared at rates comparable to or better than those for the previous four years.




Figure 29: Kent County Other Property and Social Offenses, Clearances, and Arrests, 2004 – 15

Tables 108 – 116 and Figure 29 provide detailed information about Kent County Other Property and Social Offenses, clearances, and juvenile and adult arrests. Long term trends since 2004 are also presented in Figure 29.

Sussex County Other Property and Social Offenses and Clearances

Overall, the number of Other Property and Social Offenses in the county was about 14% lower in 2015 when compared with 2011. The patterns of differences for the three most commonly occurring crimes in this category of offenses—Property Destruction/Damage/Vandalism, Fraud, and Weapon Law Violations—varied. Property Destruction/Damage/Vandalism offenses and Weapon Law Violations decreased about 31% and 8%, respectively, since 2011. The number of Fraud offenses was up about 17%.

Of special note:

- While the number of Fraud offenses was 15% higher, compared with 2011:
 - o Fraud-False Pretenses/Swindling/Con Games offenses increased by about 22%.
 - o Fraud-Impersonation offenses increased by about 19%.

Overall, less than half of all Other Property and Social Offenses had been cleared by the end of 2014. Most crimes within this category of offenses were cleared at rates well above 50%. However, the crime with the lowest clearance rate, Property Destruction/Damage/Vandalism, accounts for 46% of the crimes in this offense category, suppressing the overall clearance rate. Offenses for all crimes in this category were cleared at rates comparable to or better than those for the previous four years.




Figure 30: Sussex Cnty. Other Property and Social Offenses, Clearances, and Arrests, 2004 – 15

Tables 117 – 125 and Figure 30 provide detailed information about Sussex County Other Property and Social Offenses, clearances, and juvenile and adult arrests. Long term trends since 2004 are also presented in Figure 30.

LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCY STAFFING AND OFFICERS KILLED AND ASSAULTED, 2011 – 2015

This final section of the *Crime in Delaware* report examines the staffing trends among Delaware's law enforcement agencies and violent crimes committed against law enforcement officers.

Full Time Law Enforcement Officers and Civilian Employees

The number of law enforcement officers and civilians employed in Delaware police departments and agencies totaled 2,239 and 1,064 in 2015. The law enforcement officer total (excluding officers within the Attorney General's Office²) reflects an increase of 6.6% between 2011 and 2015. The civilian employee total (Attorney General's Office employees excluded) reflects an increase of 3.5% from 2011.

In 2015, municipalities employed just over half of Delaware's officers and nearly 30% of the civilian law enforcement employees. The Delaware State Police was the next largest employer of officers and civilians, followed by the Delaware Attorney General's Office (see Table 126). Other agencies, such as the Capitol Police, Delaware River and Bay Authority, Amtrak Police, the State Fire Marshal, and enforcement units of various state agencies, employed the remaining officers and civilians. A full list of employee counts by jurisdiction and employee type is located in Table 143 at the end of the *Law Enforcement Agency Staffing and Officers Killed and Assaulted* section.

Law Enforcement Officers Killed and Assaulted in Delaware

Assault-related offenses committed against law enforcement officers were even with 2014 and down about 25% from 2011.

Assault-related offenses committed against police officers were essentially equal to the number committed in 2014. The number committed in 2015 was lower than for any of the previous four years.

Almost all offenses, about 96%, had been cleared before the end of 2015. Assaults against officers continue to be cleared at rates above 95%. Figure 31 illustrates the trends in assaults against officers since 2004.

No officers were killed in 2015, although about 18% of assault-related offenses resulted in injuries. One officer was killed in the line of duty during the 2011 through 2015 period. The number of injuries in 2015 was comparable to those in 2014. The percentage of assault-related offenses that resulted in injury was the highest in five years, but overall assaults in general are about 25% lower.

Most assault-related offenses occurred while responding to disturbances, attempting an arrest, and handling prisoners, and most often involved single-officer vehicles. Responding to a disturbance, attempting an arrest, and handling prisoners accounted for at least 60% of assaults against officers during the 2011 through 2015 period.

Guns and bladed instruments were used infrequently during assaults on officers. During the 2011 through 2015 period, three out of every four assaults against officers involved the use of hands, fists, or feet as a weapon. On average, one in 20 assaults during this period involved the use of a firearm or a cutting instrument.

Tables 127 – 130 and Figures 31 – 33 provide more detail about assaults against Delaware officers.

Figure 31: Assaults Against Law Enforcement Officers, 2004 – 2015





Figure 32: Weapons Used Against Law Enforcement Officers 2011 – 2015







Law Enforcement Officers Killed and Assaulted in New Castle County

Assault-related offenses committed against law enforcement officers in the county has declined from 2011 totals, but was higher than 2014. Assault-related offenses committed against officers in the county were about 18% lower in 2015 when compared to 2011. The number committed in 2015 was about 8% higher than in 2014. Trends in assaults against officers in the county since 2004 can be seen in Figure 31.

Almost all assault-related offenses (95%) had been cleared before the end of 2015. Assaults against officers in the county continue to be cleared at rates around 95%.

No officers in the county were killed in 2015, although about 15% of assault-related offenses resulted in injuries. One officer was killed in the line of duty during the 2011 through 2015 period. The percentage of assault-related offenses that resulted in injury in 2015 is comparable to the previous 4 years.

Most assault-related offenses occurred while responding to disturbances, attempting an arrest, and handling prisoners, and most often involved single-officer vehicles. Responding to a disturbance, attempting an arrest, and handling prisoners accounted for almost 60% of assaults against officers in the county during the 2011 through 2015 period.

Guns and bladed instruments were used infrequently during assaults on officers in the county. From 2011 through 2015, about 70% of all assaults against officers in the county involved the use of hands, fists, or feet as a weapon. About one in 17 assaults during this period involved the use of a firearm or a cutting instrument.

Law Enforcement Officers Killed and Assaulted in Kent County

Assault-related offenses committed against law enforcement officers in the county were notably lower in 2015. Assault-related offenses committed against officers were almost 50% lower in 2015 when compared to 2011, with a 22% decrease compared to 2014. Trends in assaults against officers in the county since 2004 can be seen in Figure 31.

All assault related offenses had been cleared by the end of 2015. Assaults against officers in the county continue to be cleared at rates at or near 100%.

No officers in the county were killed in 2014, although about 21% of assault-related offenses resulted in injuries. No officers were killed in the line of duty during the 2011 through 2015 period. The percentage of assault-related offenses that resulted in injury is somewhat higher than the rates for the previous four years.

Most assault-related offenses occurred while responding to disturbances, attempting an arrest, and handling prisoners, and most often involved single-officer vehicles. Responding to a disturbance, attempting an arrest, and handling prisoners generally accounted for more than 60% of assaults against officers in the county during the 2011 through 2015 period.

Guns and bladed instruments were used infrequently during assaults on officers in the county. During the period 2011 through 2015, around three out of every four assaults against officers involved the use of hands, fists, or feet as a weapon. Assaults during this period that involved the use of a firearm or a cutting instrument accounted for about 6% of the total offenses.

Law Enforcement Officers Killed and Assaulted in Sussex County

Assault-related offenses committed against law enforcement officers in the county were almost equal to 2014 and down about 16% from 2011. Trends in assaults against officers in the county since 2004 can be seen in Figure 31.

The vast majority of assault-related offenses (95%) had been cleared before the end of 2015. Assaults against officers in the county continue to be cleared at rates around 95%.

No officers in the county were killed in 2014, although about 23% of assault-related offenses resulted in injuries. No officers were killed in the line of duty during the 2011 through 2015 period. The percentage of assault-related offenses that resulted in injury is generally comparable to the rates for the previous four years.

Most assault-related offenses occurred while responding to disturbances, attempting an arrest, and handling prisoners, and most often involved single-officer vehicles. Responding to a disturbance, attempting an arrest, and handling prisoners generally accounted for about 60% of assaults against officers in the county during the 2011 through 2015 period.

Guns and bladed instruments were used infrequently during assaults on officers in the county. During the period 2011 through 2015, more than 8 out of every 10 assaults against officers involved the use of hands, fists, or feet as a weapon. Assaults during this period that involved the use of a firearm or a cutting instrument were very infrequent, only about 1%.

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TECHNICAL APPENDIX

Detailed Explanation of Clearance Rates

In crime analysis, criminal offenses are considered to be 'solved' through either an arrest or through an alternative means when a suspect(s) has been identified but an arrest cannot be made. When an offense is solved in this way, it is considered to have been 'cleared' for crime reporting purposes. The federal definition of *clearance rate* is the percentage of offenses received that are 'solved' through an arrest or by exceptional means. An offense is 'cleared by arrest' for crime reporting purposes when at least one person is arrested, charged with the commission of the offense, and turned over to a court for prosecution.

In certain situations, an offender cannot be arrested and formally charged. When this happens, the offense can be cleared by *exceptional means*. This type of clearance can be made if the following four conditions are met:

- the offender can be identified.
- there is enough evidence to support an arrest, make a charge, and turn the offender over to a court for prosecution.
- the offender's exact location is known so that the suspect could be taken into custody immediately.
- there are circumstances outside the control of law enforcement that prohibits the agency from arresting, charging, and prosecuting the offender.

Examples of exceptional clearances include, but are not limited to:

- the death of the offender;
- confession of the offender under circumstances where prosecution is not possible (e.g., a death bed confession, a confession made while serving a life sentence in another jurisdiction and extradition for trial is not possible);
- the refusal of a victim to cooperate with the prosecution after the offender has been identified;
- denial of extradition (e.g., because the offender committed a crime in another jurisdiction and is being prosecuted for that offense);
- The handling of minor juvenile offenses outside of juvenile court as a matter of publicly accepted police policy.

Clearances involving only persons under 18 years of age

When a juvenile offender is cited to appear in juvenile court or before other juvenile authorities, the FBI considers the incident in question to be cleared by arrest, even though a physical arrest may not have occurred. When clearances involve juvenile and adult offenders, those incidents are classified by the FBI as clearances for crimes committed by adults. Since

clearance percentages for crimes involving juvenile offenders only include clearances where an adult was not also involved, juvenile clearance figures should be interpreted with caution—they do not present a definitive picture of juvenile involvement in crime.

Some Factors that Affect Clearance Rates

Single versus Multiple Offenses: In some situations, an offender may commit multiple criminal offenses, either in a single incident of crime or over several incidents. In other situations, two or more people may commit a single offense during a single criminal incident. These situations each work differently with respect to clearances. In the first example, the arrest or identification of that person can clear multiple offenses, while in the second example, the arrest or identification of several persons would only clear one offense.

The Nature of Some Types of Crime: Violent criminal offenses (murder, forcible rape, robbery and aggravated assault) often undergo a more intensive investigative effort than crimes against property. Also, victims and/or witnesses often identify the perpetrators. Property crimes such as theft from a motor vehicle or vandalism often occur in the absence of witnesses, making it more difficult to identify suspects. Consequently, violent crimes tend to have higher clearance rates than property offenses. Drug/Narcotic offenses clear at high rates because of the nature of those crimes and how they come to the attention of law enforcement agencies.
